

**VILLAGE OF ST. BERNARD**  
**SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING**

**April 9<sup>th</sup>, 2026**

The St. Bernard Village Special Council Meeting was held on April 9<sup>th</sup>, 2026, in Council Chambers.

Safety and Service Director, Mr. Wendling- So, as you are aware, the council and voters approved the energy aggregation back in November. Our partner has been working to solicit and get rates called RFP. So, we have copies of those pages in front of you with the memo. Dan Deters is here from Energy Alliances, and he will explain the process and how it can benefit.

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- So what I am passing around right now is basically what we came and talked to you about last year prior to the vote. I just wanted to give a quick refresher. Aggregation as everyone knows is we're going to take all the community's energy needs, residential, and we're going to take it out to a supplier, and we are going to try to get the best price we can to beat Duke. At this point we have sent over some pricing that we had gotten. It is at least a couple of weeks old. So, at this point, basically those prices are no good at 5:00pm every day. So, we have to go back and refresh every day until we get a price that we feel is valuable to the residents of Saint Bernard. Instead of having you call a special meeting, we've kind of devised the plan over the last couple of years that you appoint the city manager to sign the contract in between those times because in the two days that you have to give notice of a special, the price could change 10 times. So that's what we are asking you to do tonight. We do have some pricing. That pricing that you see in front of you is obviously no good at this point, but Saint Bernard is ready to go as soon as we find a price, get it signed off on, and we can start the program. If we do it in the next couple of days when we find a price, you could start in June. If that doesn't happen in the next, say, 3 or 4 or 5 days, it'll be a July start. This is just electricity. It does not include natural gas. We will come back and talk about natural gas in the next month or two. That is because since folks voted on it, Duke has changed the way they buy natural gas, but you should still see significant savings in the new pricing models. At this point, if there are any questions, I'd love to answer them.

Council Member, Mr. Moreton- My only question is, I always want to have a good rationale for why we need to pass something emergency. So, could you speak to the benefit of or the rationale of us making this decision now rather than going through our regular course where we have 3 readings and we make the decision later?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- The biggest reason is the price. I gave a contract out at 11 am yesterday and by 11:25am that pricing was no good anymore. It is so volatile that we need to be able to turn it around as quickly as we can once we get a good number. I do see the rationale that you do not want to rush into something, which we are not rushing into a contract right now. We are just giving the city manager the ability to execute that. So, what we will do is make a recommendation and show all of you what the Duke price is going to be and then we will show what the possible savings are, and then he can make a decision based on that.

Council Member, Mr. Moreton- I am understanding the rationale for authorizing the Safety and Service Director to make those decisions so we can be more nimble with the prices, but I need to know to make myself confident to vote on this tonight. So, why now and not in 2 or 3 months? Do we foresee prices going up?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- I think there are two reasons, first you are coming into your big use months with Duke. June, July and August are very heavy use months, so the sooner you get a better price than Duke's price the better. It can take some time to do the paperwork, and it can push us into July, so if we wait a few month, St. Bernard would not start until November, and summer would be over. That is all up to council. This is your program; we are just here to help you and give you all the options. The other reason is what you are seeing in the world right now. Natural gas dropped 15% yesterday and that is what is used to make electricity. So, when you see drops like that, that is when we want to try and lock in. So, if the price goes the other way and jumps back up, then we have missed our window.

Council Member, Mr. Moreton- Just so I understand, the appeal of voting on this now, is that we want to maximize the savings for residents during those high usage months. Acting on this now is going to be able to have a lower rate during those usage months versus going regular course then we miss out on the savings opportunity. Also, our Safety and Service Director signing on to a contract is contingent on us beating Duke's rate? This contract will not make people's bill more expensive?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- If you do three readings, you are going to be August, minimum. And no, we are not going to give you a rate that does not beat Duke. We just don't do it. We have situations in the past where we have run a program for a couple of years, and Duke's rate moves from May to April, so their new rate is coming out in a couple of weeks. So, sometimes Duke might have 4 or 5 months where they are lower than the market because they locked their price in before. So, we have had instances in our business where we have sent communities back to Duke for 6 months, then restarted them in another program after Duke's rates have gone up, because at the time, Duke was a better deal. We will not put you in a program that we do not feel will benefit your residents. That doesn't make us look good either.

Council Member, Mr. Schildmeyer- Can you remind us? I know once we lock in, what is the process that follows that? Is there still an opt out period if residents choose to do that? When does that clock start and stop?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- So, once you have chosen a supplier, a rate and a term, all of that is submitted to the PUCO. It sits there for 10 days. The opt out letter and everything that goes with it. Once the PUCO allows us to send it out and it hits mailboxes, it is 21 days for the opt out period. Energy Alliance does not really operate by PUCO rules because you can come and go from our programs as you please. So, while that is a 21 day opt out period at the beginning of the program, you can opt out without penalty at any time. You can come back in without any penalty as well, and you can come back in at the original price no matter what the market has done. We keep that in the contract with the supplier.

Council Member, Ms. Hausfeld- I know you said these numbers here are no longer valid. Did you by chance bring any today so we could see a new price?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- No, but we are putting the refresh out tomorrow morning. I had talked with Mark, and we had discussed initially pushing this two weeks but then I explained the timetable to him and that is why I am here today. If I had known, I would have called to get a number for today. But we will have something quickly.

Safety and Service Director, Mr. Wendling- The way the resolution is currently drafted, it authorizes the mayor to enter into the contract. If you want it to be me, then we need to change that wording on the resolution.

President of Council, Mr. Asbach- What is council's feeling on that?

Council Member, Mr. Moreton- I wanted to clarify some of the misinformation on energy aggregation that I have seen online. I am hoping that this might answer some of the questions that folks have in the back of their head. So, we chose the opt out program because it is the only path to effectively build the collective bargaining negotiating for the lowest rate. I can agree that an opt in program as an alternate would be an ideal concept, but it is just not practical because it lacks the punch in comparison that an opt out program has in terms of collective bargaining. This program is supposed to be beneficial to the folks who do not pay attention to the suppliers of their bill. Those who are familiar with their bill, have likely already found another cheaper supplier for their electricity versus Duke. The folks who do not have the default Duke plan are already not included in this program and are not automatically enrolled. In order for them to take advantage of this program, they would have to specifically opt in themselves.

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- They would have to cancel their current program, call us, then we can put them into this program. They will not be included in the auto enrollment, and they will not get a letter.

Council Member, Mr. Moreton- This program has been investigated for years with town halls and reports to council along with the ballot issues that passed in a landslide with 70% approval, and we have not rushed this at all. I wanted to clarify that for the residents. Just because it is a special council meeting tonight, this is something we have been working on for 2 or 3 years. This is a smart, calculated decision for council to make. A resident brought this idea to council. Not an employee of the village. Not an elected official. Not a rep from Energy Alliance. It was just a local resident who wanted cheaper energy bills for our community. So, we began our investigation and found it is a zero to low risk program, The opt out process is very quick and simple, and it is not like canceling your gym membership. You do not have to jump through hoops to opt out. A letter will be mailed to all folks included in this initial launch with ample time to opt out before or even after the start of the program. There are more communities with energy aggregation programs than not. Our village is kind of late at taking this approach and a bit behind the times. I just wanted to clarify that because I see people posting things, and it is just plain false. I just want people to understand fully the benefit of the program.

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- First, I would like to say, I would love to get rid of Facebook. Second, Energy Alliance does their own customer service. We are not going to just ship you off to the supplier. So, St. Bernard will have a website off our website that you can link to and call our office directly if you do not want to be in the program or if you want to join the program after the initial launch. If you call our office, you will speak with us directly, then we put you in the program, or we will take you out of the program. There is no hoop.

Auditor, Ms. Brickweg- So, if I call your number with my bill, and I am in a different energy program, can you help me see if I will save or not save?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- I can tell you what will be best for you. If you are in an 18-month program with 6 months left, I would tell you to stay in that program, and when to call me back and when to cancel the other program. So, what you have to understand about third party offers in Ohio, at the end of that third party offer, not aggregation, they have to by law give you an automatic renewal. If you do not look at that number or let it go, I promise you that you will be paying 50% more at least on that renewal. I spoke with a lady the other day paying 27 cents/kwh. That is 3 times what most of our communities are paying. You would need to contact that company and ask when is my contract up and is there an early termination fee? That is what you need to ask if you are already in a program.

Council Member, Ms. Hausfeld- For those of us that are not computer savvy, do you have a business card with your phone number?

Dab Deters, Energy Alliance - It will be on your website, but the number is 513-794-5555. You can go to St. Bernard's website as well and once we are linked, you can see out information as well on the website.

Council Member, Mr. Moreton- So, the opt out letter you mail out, will that also have all the options listed on how to opt out?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- Yes, there is an option online, a phone call or a mail in option, which I have never seen a mail in opt out come back to us. The simplest thing is to call us.

Council Member, Mr. Schildmeyer- Mark, is there any benefit to change from the mayor to the Safety and Service Director on the resolution? Can we just make that change?

Safety and Service Director, Mr. Wendling- I think the only benefit would be that I am here on a daily basis, and we do not have to call the mayor to get him in here to sign.

President of Council, Mr. Asbach- Yes, we have not given its first reading, so we can change the wording on the resolution. I only see the mayor listed once on the resolution. Does anyone else have any questions from the audience?

Tom Rolfson, 30 Clay Street- How long will you lock us in at that rate?

Dab Deters, Energy Alliance- So, we pretty much know what Duke's price is going to be until the end of 2027. Those have already been predetermined. We know that Duke's rate is going to go north above 10.75 kw/h in the next 12 months. There is nothing indicating it will be lower. So, we will not do more than 18 months, but you will have an option for 12 or 18 months.

Tom Rolfson, 30 Clay Street- Well I am saying, you lock us in, what if the market goes way down, you don't update your figures? Do you have to wait for the contract to be over before you look for a lower rate?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- No, we are always looking for lower rates but, what I am saying is we know that Duke is not going to go down. They work via a public auction, so we know what their rates are already going to be. We would not give you an 18-month price that would not beat Duke's 18-month price. The market with Duke is not going to reverse, but the real market could reverse and drop. If so, there are things you can do then, like a blend and extend, which means we can work the old rate into a new rate with a new contract but yes, we are constantly looking at the rates.

Tom Rolfson, 30 Clay Street- So you are not for sure what Duke is going to do. You are saying we project this?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- I know for sure what Duke is going to do this year, absolutely.

Tom Rolfson, 30 Clay Street- Ok, so what if you lock in this company and later you find a cheaper one?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- Well there are only four companies that are certified to do aggregation in Ohio, and we send it out to every one of them. So, they are all going to give us their best price. See, when you see those guys knocking door to door, they can capture all of St. Bernard through Energy Alliance and council, and they do not have to do door knocking. So, they guys who do aggregation are going to come to the table if they want the business.

Tom Rolfson, 30 Clay Street- How many villages or cities do you have in this area under contract?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- It is on our website, around 60. 85% of Hamilton County.

John Gerke, 618 E Ross- I am involved in the church, so is this a program that is only for residential or do churches, schools and small businesses have the ability to buy into this program?

Dan Deters, Energy Alliance- The program is for businesses and residents that use up to 700,000kw annually. If you are over 700,000kw you can get a custom bid, and we can take you out to 80 or 90 suppliers and let them bid on it. Being certified to aggregate is really expensive. They have to buy all the energy for everyone in St. Bernard for the life of the term right now, upfront. So, that will be in the millions and millions of dollars. So, some of the suppliers around Ohio can't afford that outlay of funds. So, if you look at your bill for your annual usage and it is over 700,000kw, call our number. We will do commercial business also. The people who use less than that will be automatically enrolled unless they are with another supplier.

Roll call showed all seven members were present: Mr. Moreton, Mr. Stuchell, Mr. Edwards, Ms. Hausfeld, Mr. Schildmeyer, Mr. Culbertson, and Ms. Rytov.

Motion made by Mr. Schildmeyer, seconded by Mr. Edwards, to make the change in section 1 from mayor to Safety and Service Director. Motion passes 7-0.

#### **COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE**

**April 9<sup>th</sup>, 2026**

The St. Bernard Village Committee of the Whole was held on April 9<sup>th</sup>, 2026, in Council Chambers.

A motion by Mr. Schildmeyer, seconded by Mr. Moreton, to approve the written minutes of the March 12<sup>th</sup> special council meeting and March 26<sup>th</sup> council meeting, 2026. Motion passes 7-0. Minutes will stand as submitted.

#### **REPOSRTS OF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICIALS**

Mayor, Mr. Stuchell- Thank you, Mr. President. I would first like to thank everyone who attended our annual village Easter Egg Hunt and vendor market. We had a great turnout and couldn't have had better weather. All of the kids and their families had a great time and believe it or not, I didn't get any complaints in person, nor did I see any on social media, so I guess we did something right. The Easter Bunny had a great time doing community outreach for us as well as spreading cheer throughout the community. I have to say with having first-hand experience in escorting both the bunny and Santa, the Easter Bunny may actually be more popular. Thank you

to the service department for their hard work on the set up and to our awesome recreation department for organizing a wonderful event. That concludes my report.

Auditor, Ms. Brickweg- Thank you Mr. President. I just wanted to ask council if they would consider putting an ordinance on the table for additional appropriation. First is General Fund 2-0-9 Equipment Maintenance for \$10,000. Our garbage trucks are needing a lot of repairs, so we have been going through that money pretty quickly. It will be ordinance 23 2026. The other is Streets 33-12 Traffic Lights for \$7,000. We seem to be having issues with the traffic lights either getting hit or going out. They will be on the same ordinance. Also, the state auditor came in yesterday. He said we would hear from someone in July regarding our audit with the state. That concludes my report.

Motion made by Mr. Schildmeyer, seconded by Mr. Moreton, to place Ordinance 23 2026 on the table for the next council meeting. Motion passes 7-0.

Law Director, Ms. Van Valkenburg- Thank you, Mr. President. Council, you have before you several ordinances that the Zoning Administrator and I worked on. Ordinance 16 2026 which would do away with the hearing officer position. It's basically covered at this point by the Board of Appeals and the Zoning Administrator. We ask it to go by emergency. Ordinance 17 2026 would amend chapter 59 which is the Heritage Hill District. We are proposing to add section A, compared to section B, which is the current language. We are adding section A which states applications must be filed with the zoning department. Ordinance 18 2026 which is changing section 1335.11 dealing with the right to appeal from revision related to the zoning code. Ordinance 19 2026, which approves the rezoning of certain property and amending the building zone map. I also have Resolution 5 2026, which authorizes a liquor license renewal objection, The entity in question is having difficulty following the rules of the state and local municipality jurisdiction. This then authorized me to file the appropriate paperwork with the board of liquor control to challenge the issue of renewal. Thank you that concludes my report.

Motion made by Mr. Schildmeyer, seconded by Mr. Edwards, to place Ordinance 16,17,18,19 2026 on the table for the next council meeting. Motion passes 7-0.

Motion made by Mr. Schildmeyer, seconded by Mr. Culbertson, to place Resolution 5 2026 on the table for the next council meeting. Motion passes 7-0.

Treasurer, Mr. Kathman- Thank you Mr. President. The closing balance of our Star Ohio account as of 3/31/2026 was \$10,681,681.63. That concludes my report.

Safety and Service Director, Mr. Wendling- Thank you, Mr. President. This evening there are a couple of ordinances I would like placed on the agenda, ordinances 20 and 21 respectively. It would enter into collective bargaining agreements first with the International Association of Firefighters, Local 20 representing The Villages Firefighters and the International Union of Operating Engineers. Local 20 representing the Villages Street department employees. That's the summary of the contracts. The contract TIFF provides for three-year contract raises 7% first

year, 4% the second year and 3% the third year with the first increase of the first-year retroactive back to April 1st of this year. This wage adjustment will provide a competitive wage for retention and recruitment. It also provides clarification of the sections governing parental and maternity leave and paramedic pay. Negotiations were available in the parties expeditiously coming to terms. The IE contract is a result of binding arbitration, mediation due to the inability of the two parties to reach a deal to the bargaining table after protracted negotiation. You need to declare impasse, and the mediator was selected to help resolve the outstanding issues. In the end, the mediator awarded the village's last wage offer, which is a three-year contract with wage increases of 4%, 3.5%, and 3% for employees hired after 2015 and 3%, 3% and 3% for employees hired before 2015. With the increase of the first year of the contract, they would be retroactive to July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2025. With exceptions to minor clarifications, all other contract terms remained the same. The second thing I have tonight would be an ordinance placed on the agenda from the Laws, Contract and Claims meeting, which met on April 1<sup>st</sup> to propose charter amendments to the St. Bernard Charter. This includes changing the title of Director of Public Safety and Service to Municipal Administrator and updating the duties of the position to reflect industry standards. It also combines elected Auditor and Treasurer into a single Finance Director position to be hired by the Municipal Administrator in consultation with the mayor. The proposal would convert the elected Law Director to a position to be hired by the Municipal Administrator with consultation with the mayor and village council. The Law Director would need to be experienced in Ohio Municipal Law and be admitted to the Ohio Bar. Finally, there is a proposal to amend the section governing the planning commission with a member of the village council replacing the Director of Public Safety and Service as a member of the commission, as the Director or the Municipal Administrator to avoid potential conflicts of interest. That concludes my report.

Motion made by Mr. Schildmeyer, seconded by Mr. Moreton, to place Ordinance 20,21,22 2026 on the table for the next council meeting. Motion passes 7-0.

We discussed changes to the existing charter, which are now on the table to be voted on for council's next meeting. Thank you, that concludes my report.

Prior to the concert, we'll have a Kentucky Derby Party and race viewing from 5 to 7p, with post time around 7p and concert to follow. The outdoor Aquatic Center will open for the season on Saturday, May 23, for Memorial Day weekend (Saturday/Sunday/Monday) and then begin daily hours on Saturday, May 30. Hours of operation this season will remain 11a-7p, seven days a week. The Garden Club meets on the second Tuesday of every month. This month's meeting is on Tuesday, April 14\* at 6:00pm in Centennial Hall. All are welcome to join. Council Member, Mr. Edwards- I have an idea because it is at my house too. I put it on Facebook and apparently it is a stray cat that usually hangs out on Greenlee. People feed it but it has been hanging around our house lately.

Council Member, Mr. Schildmeyer- Tom, would you like us to make a motion that Ray adopts this cat?

Safety and Service Director, Mr. Wendling- Yes, that is one of the streets we were already looking at to repave here in the near future. I will have to look into the line painting for you. I do not know that answer tonight.
